#### **PROBLEM/ISSUE STATEMENT:**

2002-2003 City Council Goal Number 7 states as follows: "Establish a Shoreline Citizens Bond Advisory Committee to review and make recommendations regarding financing City capital improvements." The City Council appointed 24 citizens to the Shoreline Bond Advisory Committee on January 27, 2003 for this purpose. Two citizens have resigned from the committee. Councilmembers Gustafson and Ransom are serving as liaison committee members.

The Bond Advisory Committee (BAC) is scheduled to meet a total of eight times and complete their work with the assistance of a committee facilitator and cost estimator for this effort. A graphic of the decision process is provided in Attachment A: Bond Advisory Committee Proposed Decision Process. The Bond Advisory Committee meeting schedule and agendas are outlined in Attachment B: Bond Advisory Committee Timeline, Agendas and Workplan.

The BAC met for the first time on March 31. They have met a total of four times to date. The committee is nearing completion of the needs assessment phase of their work. They have reviewed and discussed projects in 12 categories including: sidewalks, street improvements/greenstreets, trails, surface water improvements, economic development, gateways, open space, access to water, parks, indoor recreation and cultural facilities, outdoor recreation, and other projects that do not fit in the previous categories.

The committee has identified a broad range of projects to be considered. Their next step is to narrow the project list so that cost estimates can be developed. The Committee will also be reviewing financial information, developing criteria to use in evaluating projects for inclusion in a potential bond issue, and utilizing community information that is being gathered as part of the Parks, Recreation and Open Space Plan update.

A statistically valid community survey will be conducted in July and August to test community priorities for various categories of capital projects and to gauge public support and willingness to pay for specific projects. The BAC will utilize this community input as part of their decision process.

Final recommendations are projected to be completed August 26 with a final report to be presented to the City Council at the September 15 workshop.

**FINANCIAL IMPACT:**

There is no separate budget appropriation for this project; however, staff has identified financial resources within existing professional services accounts to provide the needed resources for the committee.

**RECOMMENDATION**

No action is required. The staff report provides updated information to the Council on the activities of the Bond Advisory Committee and their remaining work plan.


