Project Information:

(1) Briefly describe the goal of the project.

This park was purchased by the City of Shoreline in the 2006 Parks Bond. In 2020 Shoreline developed a 20year forest restoration plan. In this plan it was identified that the City has 271 acres of forested land that is in need for restoration. Southwoods park is a 15+ acre park with varying degrees of needed restoration. Adding the restoration of this park to the other restoration efforts happening throughout the City would significantly advance the City's effort to accomplish its 20-year forest restoration goals. This project includes 9.55 acres of restoration. The City of Shoreline has the goal of improving forest health by removing numerous invasive species of plants within the park and replacing the invasive species with native plant materials. The expense of this effort will be leveraged by the use of volunteers, and partnerships with non-profit organizations, which will supplement the use of City staff.

(a) Describe the estimated cost and schedule for each remaining phase of the project.

The estimated cost for this project is \$250,000. There are three key phases/tasks that will be accomplished with funding for this project: Task #1 - Site preparation including invasive plant treatment and/or removal. Retain all native vegetation. Arborist mulch shall be applied at a depth of 6" over the entire restoration site, as approved by the City Project Administrator. Task #2 - Native plant and tree installation-- the project will use high habitat value native plant species, which will also support local fauna. Task#3 - Post-planting Maintenance. Provide 4 site visits annually for a two-year period (March, May, July, September) to complete the following tasks: Cut back or step-down vegetation growth directly adjacent to tree plantings; address any invasive species requiring treatment; ensure mulch coverage is still adequate; provide watering where necessary.

(b) Describe what discrete phase of the project will be completed with the funding from this request and how this phase will benefit the public.

This funding will fully fund the restoration of the forest (9.55 acres) in Southwoods Park. The forest is currently filled with non-native invasive species, which compromise forest health and habitat for local fauna, and limit the public's ability to enjoy the full acreage of the forest (due to species, such as blackberry, which impede access). This project will also partner with local non-profits and engage volunteers, thereby furthering broader public education on forest health and other environmental issues.
