

DID YOU KNOW?

Shoreline is losing its tree canopy in neighborhoods?

More than 2,283 significant trees have been cut down since Fall 2019, including 1,173 along I-5. This does not include all trees removed by private owners, developments or all public trees removed for frontage renovations including sidewalks.

In 7 of Shoreline's building zones (20% of Shoreline)

ALL trees can be cut down without requiring any trees to be replaced.

That 7,947 units are projected to be built in the next 3 years. Per the City's study presented to Council on May 23, 2022.

Do you think climate change is affecting you?

Last summer's heat wave resulted in 100s of deaths in Washington and Oregon (3 days of 100°+ temperature).

Extreme temperatures may increase risk of heat-related illnesses, especially in areas with more paved surfaces that absorb heat.

Trees provide shade and can lower the

temperature in your neighborhood by 15 degrees. The Shoreline 2020 Climate Vulnerability Assessment states: "It's important to look out for our neighbors and work together to make sure our community is healthy and safe."

- The city must create a root-protection design for the NW corner of that sidewalk to preserve them.
- Construction methods must follow those specified in Engineering Development Manual, references 33.8.C & F regarding tree root systems protection for all trees.

Neighbors! *NOW* is the time to comment on the new sidewalk design coming to 20th Avenue NW.

1 COMPLETE THE NEW SURVEY: www.shorelinewa.gov/20AveSidewalks

The city should install an ADA-compliant sidewalk the FULL length of 20th Ave NW. An 8' wide (96 inches) is double the ADA requirement. The city's current plan creates a potential bottleneck at the 193rd crossing. Direct the money saved toward another speed deterrent.
