KAEP Comes to Kenmore

Kenmore's **A**utomated **E**nforcement **P**rograms is coming. One of three automated cameras in Kenmore is now active, issuing warnings via mail for the next two months.

This activated camera is located in the Kenmore Elementary school zone near NE 192/73 Ave NE.

Officers approve the infractions (warnings for now) via an online application (photo here). It shows both video and screenshots.

There is a 6 mile/hour cushion (26mph in the 20mph zone) before someone is "ticketed." The top score I have seen so far is 47mph in the 20mph zone.

The next camera to go active later this month is on Juanita Dr NE in the Arrowhead Elementary school zone. A few months down the road, a red light camera will be active at 61st/Bothell Way, but only for the eastbound left-turn movement (which was found to have the most conflicts with pedestrians).
