Upon arrival, he learned that the 'open window' was on the second floor of the home. Hot-Rod hollered for another of his squad to hold the rickety ladder as he played the role of hero. Yet, when we arrived to assist, Hot-Rod was standing on the moss-covered roof, with a wide grin evidencing his pride! He already climbed up the ladder, to the roof, shimmied through the window and unlocked the man's front door. By the time we saw him, he was on the roof for the second time, replacing the screen he had to remove in order to lawfully enter the home with the intention of rendering the appreciated assistance.

Deputy Rodriguez did us all proud and took the praise we all so promptly thought the Fire Department would receive. Thanks Hot-Rod, for exemplifying our mission.

I have witnessed him interacting with people in heightened emotional states, often suicidal, angry, and delusional. Officer Wunderlich manages to handle these situations with absolute professionalism, de-escalating emotions and quickly establishing trust to allow open-communication, and problem solving.

On 2/15/2024 RCR Crisis Responder John Streimikes responded to a Shoreline address, with Deputies Glavin, Lacy, and Rodriguez, and MPO Coblantz, when the RP reported that his wife had taken a bottle of pills in an attempt to kill herself by suicide. The following statement was sent as a text message to RCR Crisis Responder John Streimikes by the reporting party on 2/16/2024:

"Hi John it's Josh, I just wanted to thank you so much for your kind words and actions last night. I am extremely thankful that PD has you as a resource. You really are doing an honorable job and thank you. "Cassie is doing well and in a much better condition today. Just tired and sad but doing well. We have agreed that she should stay some time voluntarily to recover. "Please thank the officers for their time and quick response for me if you see them. Stay safe and healthy out there."

This Reporting Party took the time to commend the actions of John Streimikes and Deputies Glaven, Lacy, and Rodriguez, and MPO Coblantz despite the emotional struggles and responsibilities associated with this crisis. The manner in which those

named responded to this crisis bring honor to themselves, the profession and Shoreline Police and all are deserving of a commendation.
