Evidentiary Blood Draw Program

The King County Sheriff's Office has partnered with Shoreline Community College to launch a phlebotomy program, supported by a grant from the Washington Traffic Safety Commission. This initiative aligns with the state's Target Zero 2030 goal to enhance drug testing in crashes and DUI arrests. Officers are trained to collect blood samples from suspected impaired drivers subject to a warrant.



Blood draws will occur at designated phlebotomy stations at the precincts, or aid cars, ambulances, or medical facilities for cooperative suspects. Reluctant suspects will still be transported to the hospital for involuntary draws.

Future plans include collaborating with agencies like Seattle PD and WSP to create a regional pool of phlebotomists available for callouts, both on and off duty.

All 15 program spots were filled, including three from Precinct 5: Captain Brian Angelo, MPO Omar Jackson, and Deputy Connor Paczosa, who are now credentialed as Medical Assistant-Phlebotomists by the WA Department of Health.
