Happy Friday,

Yesterday the captains and I had our quarterly leadership meeting with the sergeants. They will have some information to share with you, if they haven't already, so I won't steal all their thunder.

I do want to touch on the topic of training though. The captains and I have a bias towards "yes" when it comes to training. If the training is relevant and will help you develop

in this career we will, in most cases, find a way to send you to the training. We won't, however, do the leg work for you to research and submit for the training. I don't expect your sergeants will either. With that being said, if you want a particular training class, please submit–just make sure you have done all the research first and you can show how this benefits you and Shoreline PD.

Also, I have authorized the sergeants to schedule their people for two skill builder firearms classes a year on top of the qualification day. I would like to send people once a quarter, but the captains and I need to sit down and determine if we can accomplish that within our budget. More to come on this.

Lastly, I have asked the sergeants to remind their people that the precinct is not a place to hangout waiting for the next call for service. We are not firefighters. Part of our job is to be out and about doing proactive patrols when we are not going to a call for

service. The precinct is a place where we drop off evidence, attend meetings, attend pre-planned training, use the restrooms, download BWC, and complete paperwork prior to securing from the shift when necessary. Other than those reasons you should be out in the field taking care of the districts. I know many of you already perform your job in this fashion and I sincerely thank you for it. For those who needed a little reminder, this is your reminder.
