Emergency Preparedness

The City of Shoreline and the Shoreline Fire Department respond to requests for information and presentations on how to ensure you are prepared at home, work and in your vehicle. Block Watch

Block Watch groups are formed by neighbors interested in mutual protection against burglary, auto theft and other crime. Shoreline Police storefront officers attend meetings to provide information about crime prevention, Operation ID, engravers and Block Watch signs. Contact: Shoreline Police Neighborhood Centers.

Ready Neighborhood

Established Block Watch groups can also become a Ready Neighborhood. Each household is asked to be ready to sustain itself for a minimum of three days, identify neighbors who need extra help in an emergency, recognize neighborhood hazards and check on neighborhood safety. Business Watch

Business Watch helps prevent crime and includes programs such as the Retail Anti-Theft Program, Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design, Crime Free Multi-Housing (landlord training), Business Watch News and monthly Burglary Crime Maps and Crime Summaries. Ready Business
