Relationship of CIP to the Budget

6 Year Capital Improvement Plan Planning Document
Meets GMA Requirements
Must be Fiscally Constrained



What is a Capital Improvement Plan?

• Long-Term Policy Document

- Identifies future capital investment priorities
- Financial planning tool for future capital investments

• Management Tool

- Forecasting future capital demands on current revenues, levels of outside assistance, and borrowing capacity
- Provides adequate time for the advance planning that is required to effectively implement capital projects
- Cost estimates and schedules based on known and assumed details and policies
 - Cost Estimates of projects in the later years have less certainty
- Coordinates capital projects with other city and agencies' projects
- A document that is flexible and subject to change Page 5

A Capital Improvement Plan is not:

- Precise project cost estimate
- A detailed project schedule
- Final scope of work until construction

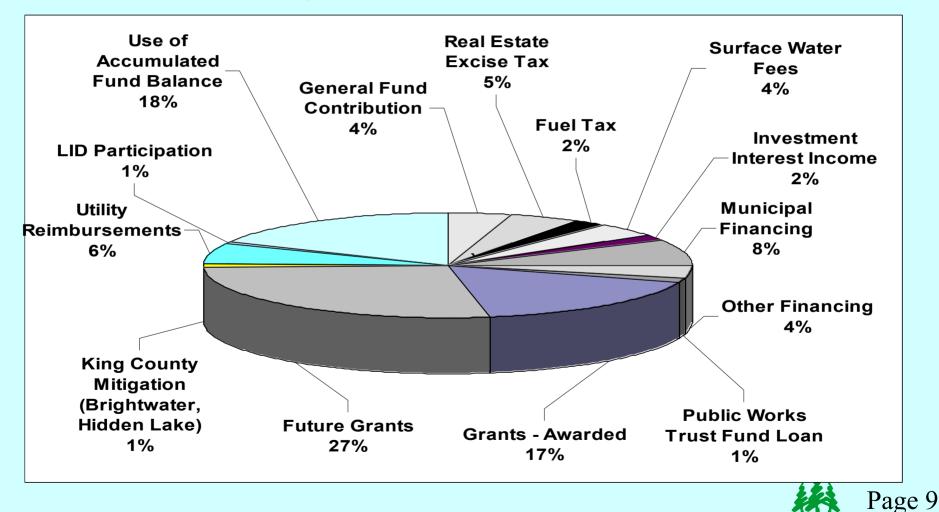

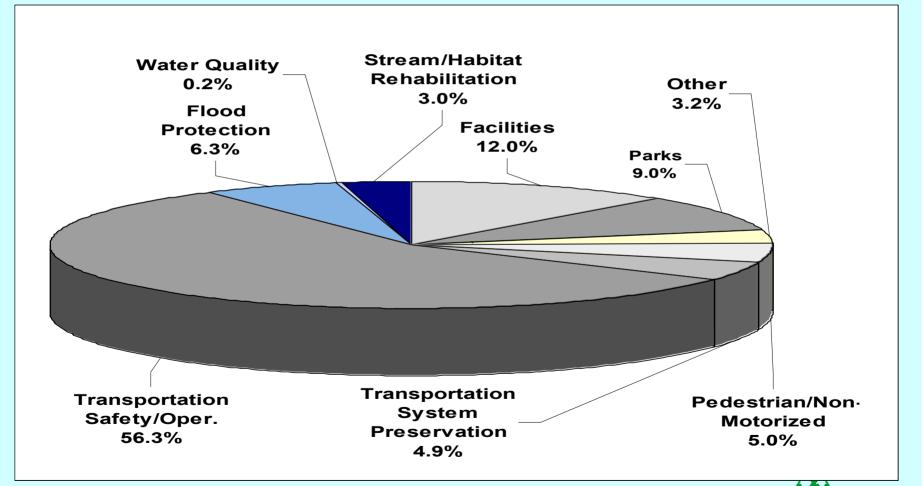

 - Excluding 165th-205th Aurora CIP totals \$80 Million
- Project categories include:

- Dependent on future grant awards
- North City Business District/15th Ave NE
 - Signal improvements at 150th and 15th Ave in 2007

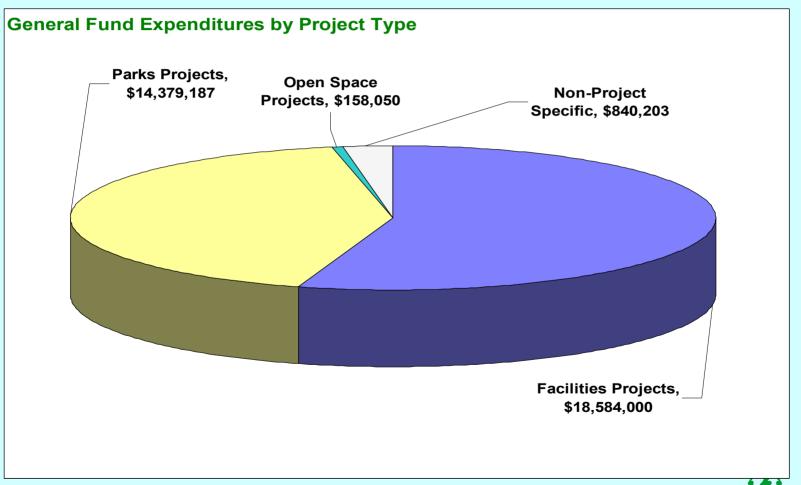

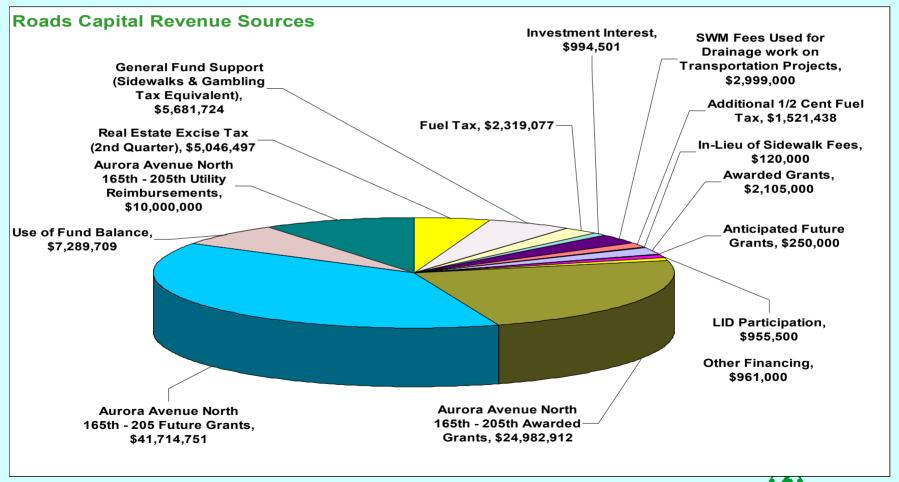

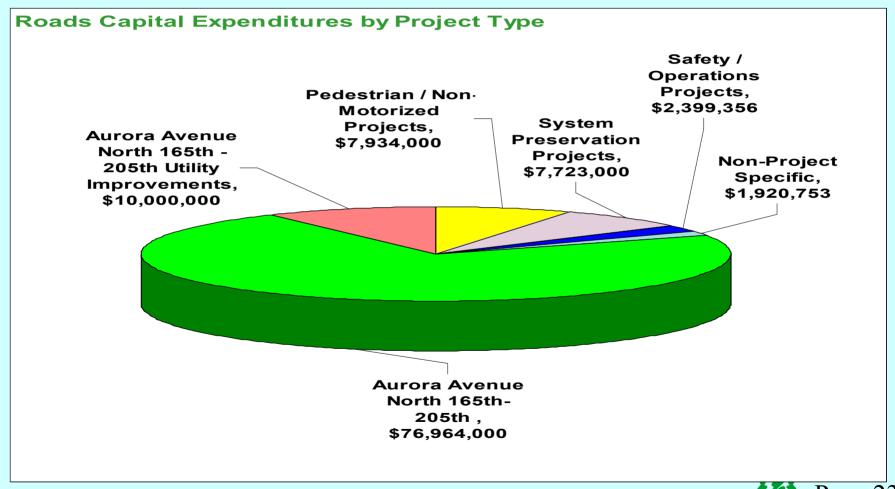

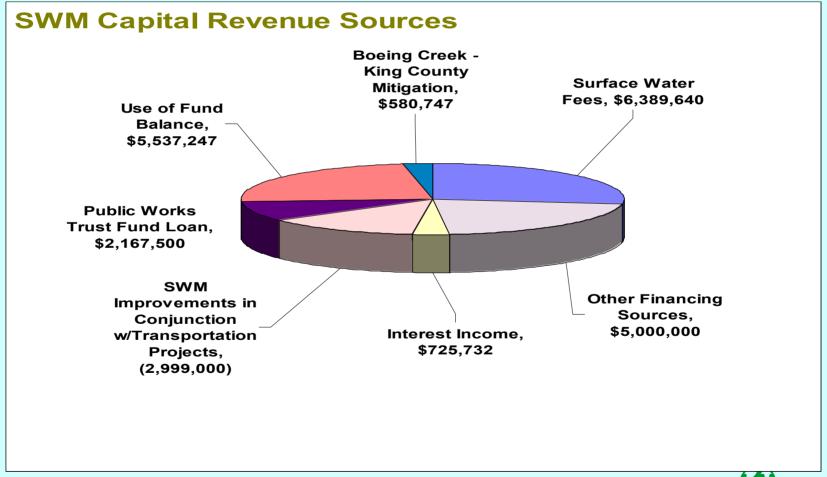


Long-Term Issues Roads Capital

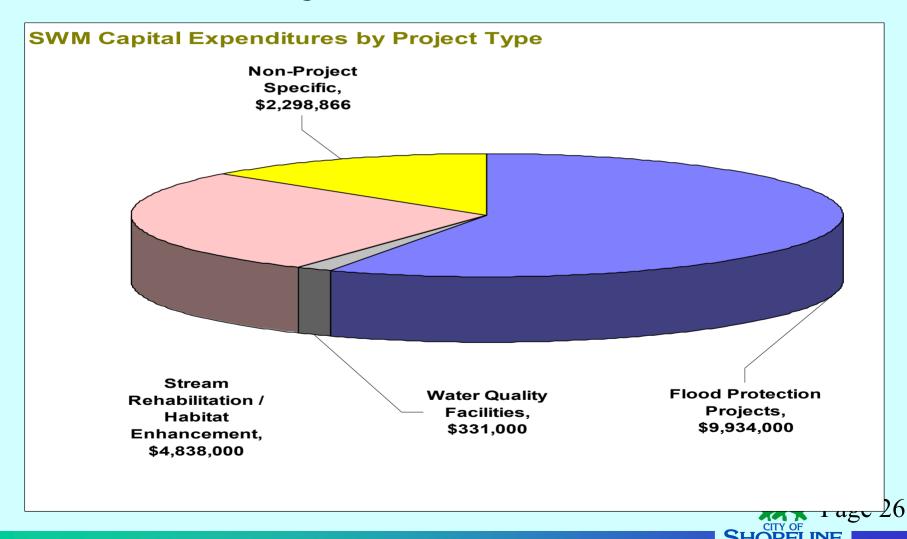
- Limited Discretionary Funding
 - Reduction in gambling tax rate to 10% has resulted in loss of \$1.8 million over the six-year plan.
 - 2005-2006 Real Estate Tax collections exceed projections. This trend may not continue in future years.
