Efficiencies

What's Already Been Done

Important to inform citizens about what's already been done – cuts, efficiencies, investments that save over long-run, contracting etc.

Sustained Commitment to Efficiencies

Important to keep looking for ways and demonstrating responsible financial stewardship of taxpayer dollars

Efficiencies if Asking for More

If going to citizens for additional revenues, they need to know what's been done already and what's being done now to assure efficiencies

Priority Areas for Efficiencies

Criminal Justice

Major cost area, explore opportunities to limit or reduce future growth

Cost-Benefit Analysis Comparisons

Help Shoreline citizens better understand what's is for City of Shoreline versus other jurisdictions

Work with other jurisdictions to make sure there is value to Shoreline

On-going Budget Review

Continue looking for areas of savings and efficiencies; in-house versus contracted services etc.

Maximize Technology for Communications

Use web; on-line systems; list serves etc.; save in mailings, staff time etc.

Review Customer Response Team Program for Savings with the use of new telephone system/other technology

Incentivize staff Involvement Encourage staff to develop costsaving ideas/ efficiencies

Other Areas for Efficiencies

Smart Partnerships

Look for savings and coordination with School District, Fire Dept., Comm. College

Volunteerism

Ask civic groups to help maintain parks & trails, neighborhood clean ups etc.

Capital budget Implications

Monitor capital project impact on operations budget

Cross-Department Review

Look for efficiencies or places for savings across city departments, minimize silos.

Pavement Surface Alternatives

Explore cost-saving, longer lasting surfaces, paving, sidewalks etc.

Economic Development

Measure outcomes; cost-benefit analysis; marketing the city as place to live, shop and work

City Memberships

Review city travel budgets and memberships – cost/benefit analysis

Shop Locally

Campaign for Shoreline residents to shop locally – keep tax dollars here

Human Services

Consider human services investments that could lower costs in criminal justice

YMCA Coordination

Coordinate recreation services with new YMCA

City Insurance

Review city insurance for possible savings – health, liability, property etc.

Transit Improvements

Improve local transit services

Judicious with consultants

Careful use of outside consultants if can be done in-house versus hiring additional staff

Individual Responsibility

City encourage citizens to support their own community, civic engagement

Funding Options Considered by All

- Transportation Benefit District
 - \$20 Vehicle License Fee
- Property Tax Levy Lift
- Business & Occupation Tax
- Gambling/Card Room Tax Increase

Preferred Funding Options for Current Levels of Service

\$20 Vehicle License Fee (+\$600k generated annually)

- Phase I: Consensus that non-voted fee is first place for additional funding
- Funds key priority (transportation and infrastructure maintenance)
- Consistent with sustainability value of City
- Easy to explain replacing revenues lost from previous initiative passed on a State-wide basis, but did not pass in Shoreline
- Be clear with citizens about what it's funding
- What are other communities doing?

Property Tax Levy Lid (+\$2m.?)

- Consider as Phase II option
- Overall, group is open to option, not necessarily unanimous yet, but all agree more information needed
 - Additional questions should be answered first How much?
- Opportunity to designate funds for public priorities, critical services, consistent with city values
- Economic conditions at time of vote?
- Reliable polling research on viability, options, levels?
- Not to compete with school district, other measures?
- Consider phasing increases to match with gap needs
- Can we wait to have available for 2011? (Vote in 2010)
- \$2m levy equates to approximately 28 cent increase on a \$364,000 home = \$102 per year
- Some concern about impact on small business
- Highest opportunity to close gap.

Mixed Opinion on Funding Options for Current Levels of Service

Business & Occupation (+\$460k per 0.1%)

No consensus, mixed opinion with some believing business should share burden with citizens – consider 0.2% generating \$920k; while others thought tax would discourage businesses from staying / locating in Shoreline – 13 other King and Snohomish County cities collect B&O tax

Gambling / Card Room Tax Increase (+\$190k per 1%)

No consensus, mixed opinions with some believing card rooms already hard hit while others remain open to 2% increase; all agree not likely to generate majority of revenue needed; concern may close some businesses; Current tax rate is 10%.

Not considered by All or Ruled out or Mixed opinion

- Business License Fee (Revenue Generating)
 - Support for small business registration fee
- Utility Tax above 6% (requiring a vote)
- Sales Tax Increase
 - Currently no legal authority to increase sales tax outside of Transportation Benefit Area legislation
- Transportation Benefit District
 - Voter Approval Required
 - Excess of \$20 vehicle license fee
 - Sales Tax Increase (0.1%)

Top Additional Priorities Funding more than current services

- Sidewalks / Pavement Maintenance
- Traffic Signal Coordination
- Volunteer Coordination leverage city resources, evaluate cost-effectiveness
- Economic Development
- Senior Services ?

Top Additional Priorities Funding Options for Consideration

Levy Lid Lift Designate for priorities

Transportation Benefit District

- Traffic signal coordination
- Other transportation needs?

Bond Measure

- For capital improvements, like city pool
- Consider separate bond measure

Additional Priorities Cost-Saving Options to Consider

Maintenance/Police

Combined new Maintenance Facility and Police Station at Fircrest

Economic Development

Consultant or volunteers, not permanent new staff yet; or new Director with deliverables

School Resource Officer

Consider other non-profits for funding or services

Police/City Hall

Explore future police station needs with new city hall – possible savings?

YMCA

Possible agreement with YMCA to provide some services in exchange for City contribution

Surface Options

Explore asphalt/sidewalk options for savings, increase longevity

Misdemeanor Work Projects

Possible lower costs for maintenance, parks etc. depending on cost of safe program, follow up

Transit Improvements / Savings

Improve transit services from Sound Transit and Metro

Ferry District Prop Tax – better services for current investment or explore getting funds back

Strategic Zoning & Development

Understand type of development and growth and the potential positive or negative impact on city budget

Local Improvement Districts

For sidewalks, consider Local Improvement Districts (LID's) for funding
