These items are accepted at the Shoreline station for recycling at no charge: Cell phones, PDAs, two-way radios, and household batteries including "button batteries" and alkaline batteries.

We <u>do not</u> accept computers or monitors at the Shoreline station.

Free Recycling Program for TVs, Computers and Monitors Starts January 1, 2009 in Washington State

Starting January 1, 2009, electronics manufacturers in Washington State are required to provide free recycling programs for TVs, computers, and monitors to residents

Can I throw my TV, computer, monitor, and fluorescent bulbs and tubes in the garbage?

No. These items contain hazardous materials, such as mercury and lead, which are harmful to human health and the environment. You can recycle these items at many locations in King County.

Where can I recycle my computer, monitor & other computer equipment?

Take it Back Network (TIBN) businesses accept those items for reuse or recycling and charge and fee. The closest TIBN member to the Shoreline Recycling & Transfer Station that accepts computers, monitors and other computer equipment for recycling is:

Where else can I recycle fluorescent light bulbs and tubes?

City of Shoreline residents can recycle them through their curbside recycling program. Special handling and limits apply so check with the city (206-546-1700) or the recycling hauler, CleanScapes (206-859-6700, www.cleanscapes.com) for more information.

Some Take it Back Network businesses accept fluorescent bulbs & tubes for recycling and charge a fee. You can also take fluorescent bulbs and tubes to household hazardous waste facilities in King County for no charge. Contact King County Solid Waste Division or visit www.takeitbacknetwork.org for more information.

Will my TV still work in 2009 when TV broadcasting switches to digital?

Yes, but you may have to make some changes.

If you have a TV connected to cable, satellite or other pay TV service, it does not require a TV converter box – no action is required – even if you have an analog TV.

If you have a TV that uses antennas or "rabbit ears" and has only an analog tuner, you will need to get a digital-to-analog converter box to watch over-the-air TV. The converter box plugs into your TV and will keep it working after Feb. 17, 2009. A TV Converter Box Coupon Program allows households to obtain up to two coupons, each worth \$40, which can be applied toward the cost of eligible converter boxes.
